

How do I graduate with Honors?

Am I eligible to begin the Honors Program?

Have any one of the following:

First-Time Students:

- high school GPA of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale
- ACT composite score of 21 or above
- ACT reading score of 18 or above
- Accuplacer Classic reading score of 85 or above

Returning Students:

- overall GPA of 3.0 or above on a 4.0 scale
- complete projects within the semester the contract is signed

Students are limited to:

- 2 Honors courses per semester
- 1 Honors course per instructor in any one semester.

What happens if I change my mind?

Fill out a "Request to Reverse the Honors Option" form by the published last date to drop a class.

How do I graduate with honors?

Meet all of the following criteria:

- an overall GPA of 3.0 or above
 - complete a minimum of 4 classes totaling at least 12 credit hours of Honors courses
 - receive at least a "B" in all Honors courses
- NOTE: A "C" or below in any Honors course will disqualify you from the program! You may not take an extra Honors course to make up for a "C."
- schedule an exit interview with the director of the Honors Program/Arts & Sciences Dean, during the semester you plan to graduate

NOTE: The Honors option excludes extensions or an "incomplete" grade.

How do I get started?

1. Review the program requirements.
2. Ask your instructor within the first two weeks of class if he or she would recommend you for the Honors Program (or the first week for summer classes). Students enrolled at any MAC campus may take advantage of honors credit as long as the instructors teaching those classes are willing. Your instructor will discuss the details of your honors project plans and help you sign up.
3. Know the dates to add or reverse an Honors course.
4. Schedule your exit interview with the director of the Honors Program/Arts & Sciences Dean during the semester you plan to graduate.

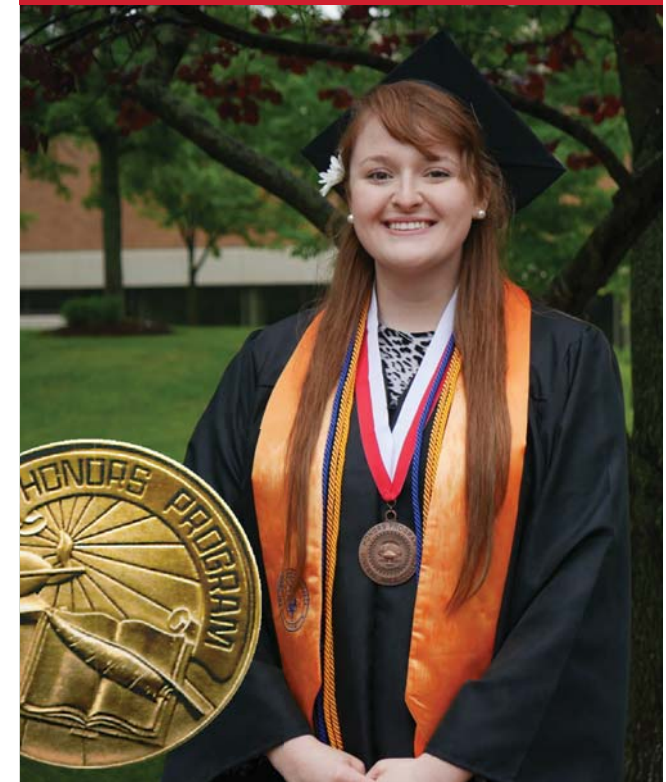
