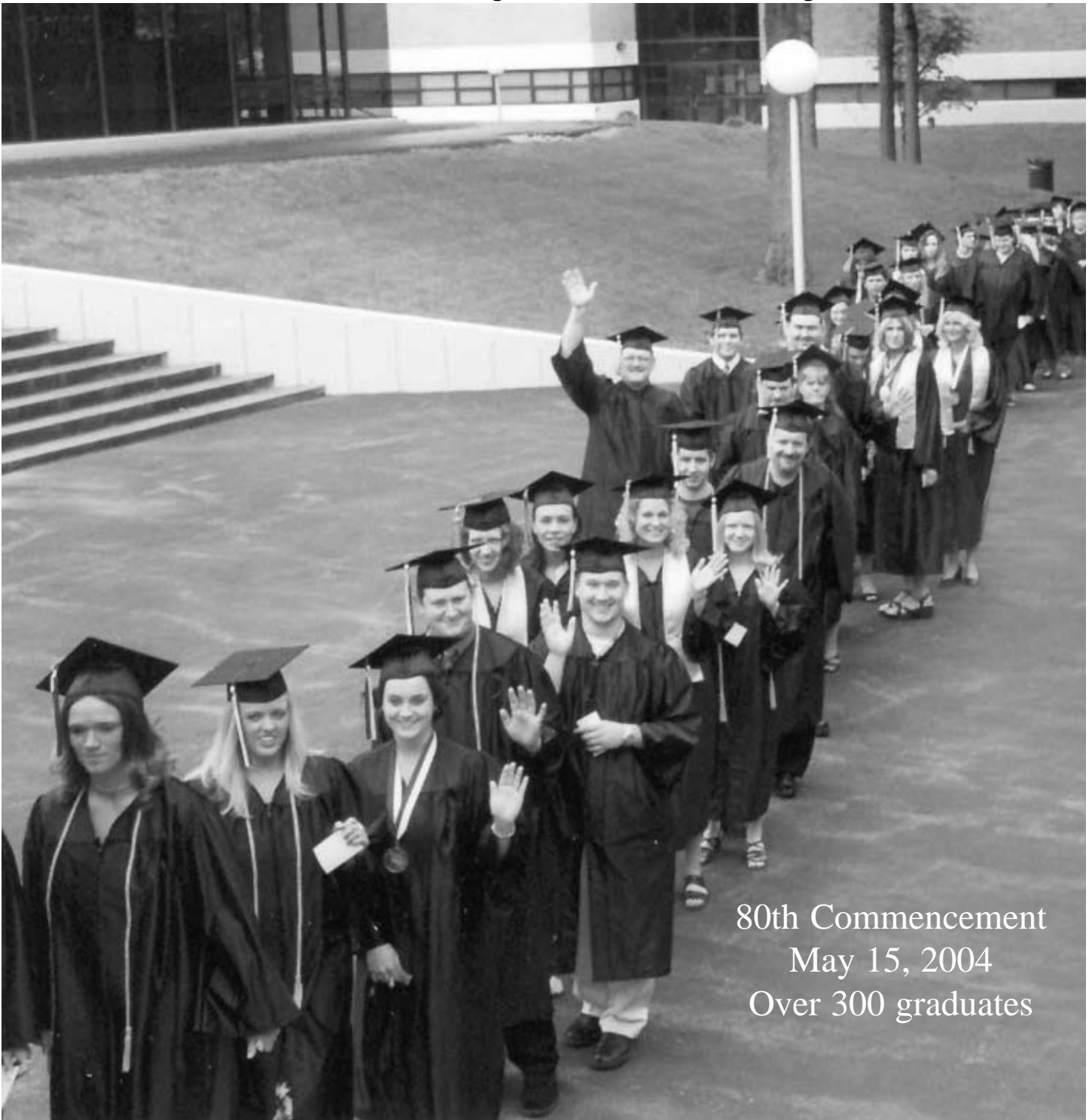

MAC “Paver”-ing the Way to a New Quadrangle

As part of its effort to beautify the Park Hills campus Quadrangle, MAC Foundation is selling engraved paver bricks as a fundraiser to support part of the Quad’s overall renovation. “It’s a unique way to memorialize or observe important milestones, honor an individual or even advertise your business partnership with MAC. We’re excited about the project and invite individuals, alumni and businesses to be a part of the campus,” elaborates Brian McNamara, Mineral Area College Foundation Board member. “The Foundation has enlisted the assistance of Mineral Area College’s Student Government Association to sell the paver bricks for the Quadrangle. Getting students involved with the activities on and off-campus is an important component of student life.”

The paver bricks will be permanently placed in the Quadrangle’s new brick walkway. As a lasting addition to the campus, the bricks are a unique way to honor loved ones or friends, recognize graduations or other special events. The MAC Quadrangle is situated among the four original campus buildings and will soon be 40 years old. Renovation plans will soon be finalized and provide a Quadrangle facelift, retaining the beautiful oak trees and enhancing the overall appearance as an outdoor student and community area. Some beautification plans include landscaping, gardens, benches, outdoor seating, and an engraved paver brick walkway.

More Spaces Make Easier Paver Designs

Now it’s easier to design wording for your paver brick. A perfected laser technique increases the number of spaces per line to 20 rather than the original 13. There are two paver options. The standard paver brick, priced at \$100, is 4” by 8” and holds three lines of text with 20 spaces per line. The corporate logo bricks, 8” by 8”, sell for \$250 each and hold a corporate logo and text. For corporate brick orders and other paver brick information, contact Peggy at (573) 518-2114. Staples Memorial Scholarship Nears Goal

According to Mineral Area College President Terry Barnes, “Contributions are still welcomed for the Danny Staples Memorial Endowed Scholarship Fund. We are getting close to the \$20,000 goal for the scholarship. We are thankful friends and associates of Danny cared so deeply about him and his efforts to advance higher education in our area to establish this scholarship.”

Missourians who live and work in the Mineral Area College District profited from Senator Staples’ work as a legislator where he served six years in the House and 20 years in the Senate before retiring because of term limitations. The former Senator Staples passed away last July from a heart attack. Many remember his contributions to Mineral Area College and his reputation as a Missouri lawmaker. MAC alumni Mark D. Hughes, who worked closely with Senator Staples, described Danny’s career as state senator, “... In the upper chamber of the great limestone building, a man who has distinguished himself in his own regard steps for the last time onto the floor of the Senate Chamber, a place that has been his second home for two decades. It is September 12 (2002). It is the last day of a regular legislative session for a lawmaker who, more than most, filled Jefferson’s dreams. His friends and his neighbors in the deep hills of the Ozark National Scenic Riverways know him as Danny ... Danny Staples. But in Missouri’s most exclusive arena, he is universally known as the Senator from Shannon.”

WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND CAMPUS.....

Elaine Belovich, director of the EXCEL program, announced that Potosi resident **Bridgette Jones**, an EXCEL/SSS student since July 2002, won a \$500 MO-KAN-NE scholarship. Bridgette is a member of Phi Theta Kappa, a national honor society for students of two-year colleges. She plans to transfer to University of Missouri-St. Louis in January 2005, where she will major in Secondary Education/English. Applications are evaluated based on TRIO eligibility criteria, GPA, evidence of community involvement and/or leadership, educational and/or financial obstacles, and a student essay which addresses need for the scholarship, personal character, and commitment to excellence.

Dr. Fred Nute and Psi Beta welcomed St. Louis Channel 5 news anchor Art Holliday to campus to present his award winning documentary, "Before They Fall Off the Cliff," about a St. Louis family's tragedy with schizophrenia. "The documentary has received wide acclaim by mental health organizations," explains Dr. Nute. "The documentary presents a great opportunity for us to increase public awareness of mental health issues, especially learning more about the fallout that mental illness can have on the family, as well as society at large."

Carol Moore, longtime music instructor at Mineral Area College and one of the Parkland's influential figures in music education, received the Cultural Recognition Award from the Mineral Area Council on the Arts during intermission of the 2004 St. Louis Symphony Orchestra performance. Carol joined Mineral Area College faculty in 1984, and has since served as director of bands, chairperson of the MAC Music Department and coordinator of the MAC Jazz Festival and Jazz Camp. Under her direction, the MAC Jazz Band consistently won awards at Elmhurst College Jazz Festival and was selected to perform at the Easter in Maastricht Music Festival in the Netherlands in 2001. Her students have been selected to participate in the Missouri All-Collegiate Orchestra and the Missouri All-Collegiate Jazz Band since 1988. An accomplished pianist, she has performed with many soloists and groups in a wide variety of musical styles. She served as the accompanist for the Missouri Community College Choral Festival for more than 10 years, and has been a presenter at the Missouri State Choral directors' convention in Jefferson City.

Coach Lana Labruyere reports, "Arcadia Valley basketball star DeAnna Anderson signed a national letter of intent to play for Mineral Area College, where she will major in Biology. DeAnna is the all-time leading scorer in Arcadia Valley history with 1,886 points, and holds 10 other school records. She has been named to the Class 3 All-State Second Team each of the last two seasons after earning First Team All-Region honors. She was also voted the Most Valuable Player at the 2004 Daily Journal MAAA All-Star Game."

MAC Basketball Cardinal David Bryant will play his next two years of college basketball at the University of Southern Indiana at Evansville. David was one of MAC's excellent ball handlers and passers and averaged 13 points and six assists per game.

Lorenzo "Zo" Gordon is transferring to Illinois State of the Missouri Valley Conference. "He was the first MAC player ever to average over 20 (21.3) points and 10 (11.1) rebounds per game," reports Coach Tim Gray. "Lorenzo was named third team All-American by the National Junior College Athletic Association. Lorenzo also earned First Team All-Region 16 and All-MCCAC Conference honors. He finished his MAC basketball career with 994 points as MAC's seventh all-time leading scorer and is the school's leading rebounder."

Three MAC alumni are candidates for local political races. **Curt Boyer** (Park Hills) and **Brad Robinson** (Bonne Terre) are seeking the Missouri House of Representative 107th District seat. **David Cramp** (Farmington) is a candidate for the House of Representatives 106th District seat.

The Cecil Roberts Memorial Nursing Fund has been established by a Mineral Area College nursing graduate. The anonymous donor's contribution is a tribute to Cecil Roberts, long-time Farmington resident, for his encouragement that fostered this alumna's successful completion of the nursing program. The Cecil Roberts Memorial Nursing Fund is designed to assist MAC Nursing students with funds for "emergency" situations that will help keep them in school. Jessie was honored with the Governors' Award for Excellence in Teaching which was another milestone in Jessie's 27-year career in the college's Allied Health Department.

Fredericktown's Kyle Tesreau recently signed a national letter of intent to continue his education and play baseball for Mineral Area College. In addition to being one of the area's top high school baseball players, Kyle has been successful on the basketball court, and as the quarterback of the Blackcat football team. His parents are Rick Tesreau and Connie Crowell.

Danetta Montgomery of Fredericktown was one of 30 students of the state's top scholars honored at the Plaza Hotel in Jefferson City this spring. The All-Missouri Academic Team is coordinated by the Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society and the Missouri Community College Association. The All-Missouri Team recognizes the scholarly achievements and leadership accomplishments of the top (30) students enrolled in two year colleges across the state of Missouri. Danetta served as President of Phi Theta Kappa, a member of Psi Beta (the honor society of psychology), and as a students activities counselor at Mineral Area College. Danetta will continue her education this fall at UMSL, working toward her bachelor degree of Sociology/Social work. Mineral Area College is very proud that Danetta was recognized for her achievements.

Following Family Tradition

For many alumni, attending FRJC or MAC is a family tradition. Such is the case for Dorothy Ann (Deneke) Gerig who attended FRJC in years 1944 through 1946. Dorothy's father, Dr. Wesley A. Deneke, was the FRJC dean in the 1930s. Her older brother Dr. Milton Deneke attended FRJC, earned a medical degree and practiced in Memphis where he now resides. Her late husband Carroll B. Gerig graduated from FRJC as did their three children: Robert C. Gerig (Carbondale, IL), Mary Ann (Mrs. Jon) Turner (Belgrade, MO) and John A. and Lisa (Dismuke) Gerig (Japan).

From FRJC, Dorothy transferred to SEMO and earned her B.S. in Elementary Education with a major in Art and Science in 1948. She was very active in early childhood education. Her teaching career spanned five decades. She taught kindergarten in Tulsa; fifth grade, art and kindergarten in Leadwood for three years; and finished her career teaching kindergarten and art in the Central Elementary School.

"I enjoyed teachers as Mary Clark, Irene Bloom, Laura Ellen Wadsworth, Annie L. Huggins," remarks this Park Hills resident. "They were all very intelligent people who presented their specific subject matter in an interesting manner that made our education enjoyable and very important. These teachers made a big impact on the careers of so many students. FRJC set the stage for future education beyond FRJC and today provides great educational options for people in our area. Still today MAC provides many new experiences for getting out in the world and interacting with different people."

Dorothy says there were so many good people at FRJC. Jayne Ann Wycoff, Rowena (Brown) Simmons, Mildred (Reeder) Lee, Alice Hibbitts and Lois (Meyers) Koch are just a few. May 15 Marks the College's 80th Commencement Ceremony

It was 80 years ago when Flat River Junior College held the institution's first commencement exercises on May 14, 1924. The FRJC Class of 1924 graduated 12 students in the FRHS/FRJC Auditorium. Mineral Area College and its predecessor Flat River Junior College can proudly state more than 10,000 students have graduated from the institutions.

This year's commencement exercises were held in the Robert E. Sechrest, Sr. Field House on Saturday, May 15. It was standing room only for family members and friends who witnessed the 2004 graduation ceremony for over 300 students.

The commencement speaker was Quentin Wilson, Missouri commissioner of higher education. "We were delighted to have Mr. Wilson speak to the 80th graduating class," said Dr. Terry L. Barnes, Mineral Area College president. "As one of Missouri's oldest community colleges, MAC has played an important role in the state's history of colleges and universities. It is wonderful to have the leader of Missouri's higher education speak during this milestone commencement ceremony."

FRJC the third public junior college in Missouri, behind Kansas City and St. Joseph. The fourth was at Trenton. FRJC had an enrollment of 400 its last year of 1964-65.

Mineral Area College men's basketball program announced a head coaching change for the 2004-05 season. After 20 years with MAC basketball, Tim Gray decided to draw his MAC coaching career to a close and pursue other campus challenges. Assistant Coach Corey Tate was named as MAC's new head coach.

Tim joined the MAC staff in 1984, assisting Bob Sechrest and teaching in the English Department. For the 2004-05 year, Tim continues his classroom teaching and assumes the college's Athletic Director title.

- ❑ MAC was ranked in the Top 10 five times in the NJCAA polls since 1993

- ❑ 1996 served USA Basketball as a selection coach for the undefeated World Championship that was played in Caguas, Puerto Rico.

Tim has developed many fabulous relationships over the years. "I am proud to say that everything we have accomplished over the years has been done by the rules. Players who came to MAC really wanted to be here for the right reasons," says Tim. "We have really had a lot of fun. God sent us some athletes and some coaches with wonderful personalities that have made this coaching a real joy. I am most proud of two things that happened away from the court. First, we have seen so many poor to average students come here and leave with some increased maturity and, most importantly, a degree from MAC. Also, I have seen many irresponsible, immature 18-year-olds leave as 20-year-olds ready to contribute to society. These are the two most important contributions. I am a believer in Mineral Area College and our community in and around St. Francois County. I see what MAC does to make this community a better place. I am proud to be a resident of this area and faculty member at the best community college in the state of Missouri."

Despite his accomplishments, Tim says, "I have one frustration. I am leaving with no trips to Hutchinson, Kansas, for final 16 of the NJCAA. It is tough to get there from this region and district. Since I have been here, seven national champions have been crowned out of our district, so obviously we competed at a very high level. We had four or five teams very capable of making it; however, it was just not in the Cards you might say." Looking to the future, he says "The exciting thing is that we have left the program in great shape. Corey Tate is going to do an outstanding job. He will attract the kind of players that will make a trip to Hutch a real possibility. I have had great staffs over the years. Assistant coaches Roy Tims, Larry Morgan, Jim Komar, Jason Samples,

Kevin Gray, Chad Mills, Kent Huddleston, Zack Mills, Charles Williams, Andre Peppers, Dylan Naeger, Roy Henson, Paul Fritch, Jason Labrash, Randall Skaggs, Giovani Azoni, Donnie Shores, Tim Tripp, Jon Clauser, and Corey Tate have all been fabulous. They actually did all of the work that won the games. But the one who allowed us to turn the corner and be a national power in the mid-90's was the late Mike Brewen. I thought I knew what I was doing until he explained to me clearly that I did not know anything. He was superb, and I still miss him. The last comment has to be for Bob Sechrest. My career would not have happened if he had not been willing to give a brash, dumb, thought-he-knew-everything-and-did-not-know-anything 23-year-old kid an opportunity 20 years ago. Thank you, Coach, it has been a lot of fun. Sech is MAC basketball; he will always be MAC basketball."

Bond Projects Near Completion

In April 2002, voters in the Mineral Area College District approved a \$6 million bond issue to fund renovations on the Park Hills campus and the construction of the Fredericktown Outreach Center. College President Dr. Terry Barnes and the Board of Trustees are pleased to report the bond projects are nearing completion.

Faculty members moved into the remodeled and spacious offices at the start of the spring semester. The wellness center and new field house locker rooms were also completed for the Spring 2004 semester. Faculty and students moved into the new Fine Arts Building and held the first classes for the summer term. The fine arts facility includes several enhancements. The main floor of the building houses art classrooms, a scene shop, an extended backstage area, more storage space, offices, general classrooms, insulated band rooms, student lounge, and new restrooms. Dressing rooms and showers for theater students, a costume room, and additional storage space are in the basement. On the third floor are music department studios, seven practice rooms for individuals or small groups, a music library, a music seminar room, choral room and a computerized music room, a dark room, and offices. The addition adds six much needed general classrooms.

Despite some construction waylays at the Fredericktown site, plans are to hold fall classes starting in August. The 10,000 square foot building will feature six general classrooms, a computer lab, library, student commons and faculty offices, and will have the capacity to teach 250 students at one time.

The Fredericktown Outreach Center is located adjacent to Black River Electric Cooperative on Highway 67. Mineral Area College classes have been held in the Fredericktown High School since 1986. The new building enables Mineral Area College to offer classes during the evening and the day and even during the summer months, creating more educational opportunities for residents of southern Missouri.

The baseball field hosted the first MAC Cardinals baseball games this spring. Students, MAC employees and area residents came to the new field on campus to watch MAC Cardinal baseball. The baseball field dedication was part of the April Open House to allow area residents to visit the bond election projects.

Coach Loughary Recalls MAC Baseball Advice

For 20 years, Hal Loughary coached Mineral Area College baseball. Coach Loughary provided some “MAC Cardinals Baseball” remarks at the field dedication this spring.

Hal flashed back to 1967, when Dr. Richard Castor, MAC president, and Bob Sechrest, basketball coach and athletic director, approached him about becoming the baseball coach of the newly formed community college. “Coach Sechrest assured me the job ‘would be a piece of cake’,” chuckled the retired coach. “He added that we should win 90 percent of our games... It didn’t seem too long after that when I read the headline of my first season: *MAC Breaks 15 Game Losing Streak.*”

Things did go much better for Coach Loughary and the MAC baseball program. During his 20 years as head coach, he survived many spring baseball trips and his teams won about 58 percent of the games. The 1981 season posted 40 wins and 10 losses, the best record.

“Getting this baseball field at MAC has been a long struggle and it pleases so many area MAC baseball fans and local families to finally see the MAC baseball team have a field to call its own and a true home field advantage,” stated Hal with pride.

“I have absolutely no regrets about my two decades at MAC. They were the best years of my life and I met a lot of great people, many of them are young men who played for me. Many outstanding young men who were affiliated with MAC baseball went on to successful careers. I enjoyed and respected them all. We remember our kids who made it to the major leagues as Tim Lollar, Scott Little, Steve Bieser. We also remember those who share the game by teaching and coaching like Mark Hogan, head baseball coach at SEMO and Keith Guten who coached at Southwest Missouri State for many years.” The 76-year-old retired coach lives in Farmington and enjoys hearing from his former players.
